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ABSTRACT

The guide aims to tell you the submission format for the Proceedings of International Conference at University of Sri Jayawardenepura, Nugegoda, Sri Lanka. First, all submissions must be submitted on-line or via the conference mail by the due date. Second, your paper title must be concise to briefly reflect your research point. Hence, a tedious paper title will not be accepted and the length of your paper title cannot exceed 16 words. Third, the review decision notifications with an acceptance or rejection email will be sent to the corresponding author in 14 days after submission. After receiving the review result, the authors are encouraged to prepare the final camera-ready paper before the deadline shown on the website. Fourth, other information is also available on the conference website. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us. We look forward to your participation. Finally, please note that the length of short abstract is only one-page and must have 3-5 key words as shown below.
